English	<p>Think about the books you have read so far this year - one of your own or our class reader ('There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom'). Pick your favourite.</p> <p><b>Create an inspirational book review poster about this book.</b> You may wish to create it using the computer or make the poster by hand.</p> <p><i>Try to include the following aspects: a front cover image (collaged on or drawn), introduction to the main character (Who are they? What makes them special/ interesting? Personal description.), summary of the plot, favourite words and phrases used in the text and an explanation of why you would recommend it to someone else. You can add anything else you might like to include and try to make it as colourful and eye-catching as possible. We'd love to display some so feel free to bring them in to school.</i></p>
Maths	<p><b>To re-engage our arithmetic brains ready for the term ahead, let's get back into an Arithmetic Friday practice today on a Monday.</b> Use the booklet of questions attached in Seesaw or on the school website. You do not need to print them out but may if that suits you. You could view the questions on screen then record your methods and final answers on some paper or in your homework book if you have it at home.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- There are 36 questions to try. Do what you can. Be brave and try the tricky ones. Skip anything that you are really stuck on and try something else.</li> </ul> <p><b>If you'd like a further challenge, set a timer for 30 minutes and complete it as if it were a test.</b></p> <p><b>If you need some support,</b> ask someone at home to support you by talking through each question if you find that helpful or seeking out some online guidance for that question type. You can also break the questions down by completing them in 3 X 10 minute slots if you prefer – it is allowed! Ask someone at home to help you organise this.</p> <p>Once you finish or the timer beeps, take a moment to check though your answers. <b>Check for any 'silly' errors before you mark.</b> At this point, you can still make some changes if you notice an error.</p> <p><b>Use the marking key to help you check your answers.</b> This can be done by you or someone else at home.</p> <p><b>Record the final score out of 40.</b> You can bring this back to me to share if you would like to do so.</p>
